Well, April showers getting ready for May flowers. The year is already one quarter over. As I write this we are in the midst of Holy Week, we are reliving the Lord's passion as a reminder of the sacrifice that God made for us by giving His only Son so that our sins would be forgiven. Sometimes, I believe, we do not fully appreciate the depth of that sacrifice. As we look at our lives we all can recall times in which we have made sacrifices. Sacrifices for the good of our children, our spouses, our homes, and our jobs. Some have made even greater sacrifices through their service in the military, protective services, and even at times ordinary people in helping complete strangers. I believe at times as humans when we make sacrifices we tend to make sacrifices for those we feel are deserving of such sacrifices.

Would you make a sacrifice for someone who had wronged you? Someone who had abused you or scorned you? As sinful humans we tend to hold grudges, both knowingly and unknowingly. Our ability for both forgiveness and making sacrifices, which I believe are closely related and actually sometimes the same, is often tied to what we feel in our hearts. We, as Christian, are however reminded that we must always be open to both forgiveness and sacrifice. As proof texts I am going to reference the apostles Paul and John.

Paul writes in Romans 5: ⁶ For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷ For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die— ⁸ but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

And from John in 1 John 3: ¹⁶ By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers. ¹⁷ But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him? ¹⁸ Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth.

As we celebrate Easter, as we are reminded of the ultimate sacrifice made by Jesus on that cross, while we were still sinners, remember we are to love in deed and in truth. That means we make the sacrifice, even though we may have been wronged before. We forgive again, even though we have been burned before. We reach out with God's truth, we share God's love. And why, because we know, that because of God's willingness to sacrifice His Son on that Cross and more importantly His willingness to raise Him from that grave after the third day, our sins are forgiven and we have been granted eternal life with Him in heaven.

So my friends, do not fear this world, do not be afraid to sacrifice or forgive. God wasn't and by His glory, through the sacrificial death, and the resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ he claimed you as His own, now and forever.

Blessings to all of you this Eastertide, and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Stewardship Thoughts

As this article for April was being written, this writer sometimes takes for granted the resources available to write an article about stewardship. Wouldn't call that practicing what you preach. Humble pie anyone?

This article comes from the publication "Lutherans Engage the World" where Mark Hofman, the executive director of LCMS Mission Advancement explains that the LCMS is at the forefront of "intergenerational ministry." That is where children and young people are in regular contact with people of mature years and vice versa and all grow together in discipleship.

So the question is, what does this have to do with stewardship? Young people are one of God's greatest blessings. The LCMS invests time, talent, toil and treasure in the next generation of Christian disciples.

One example is the Synod's official archive the Concordia Historical Institute where young people can learn from our mistakes and joys as they learn to lead and carry the Gospel forward into the world.

We invest in Lutheran Schools, from daycare (LFOJ) to universities and seminaries as well as ministering to young people from local youth groups to the office of National Mission's Youth Ministry.

Lastly, we invest in our young people through catechesis, intentional instruction in the chief parts of the Christian faith using a treasure handed down from one generation to the next over nearly 500 years: Luther's Small and Large Catechisms. The LCMS also equips pastors, directors of Christian outreach, school teachers and others to support the parent's task of raising up a child in the way God wants that child to go.

Apparently what we do has caught the attention of other Christians who are beginning to seek us out. To God be the glory!

Martha, meanwhile, was distracted with preparing and serving the meal for the group. Frustrated, Martha scolded Jesus, asking him whether he cared that her sister had left her to fix the meal alone. She told Jesus to order Mary to help her with the preparations. "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:41-42)

For centuries people in the church have puzzled over the Martha and Mary story, knowing that someone has to do the work. The point of this passage, however, is making Jesus and his word our first priority. Today we come to know Jesus through prayer, church attendance, and Bible study.

Old Business:


