Welcome to August, I have a feeling this month will be flying by, just like the last two, where is the summer going. Before I start, I just want to take a moment to remind people that we could really use some help with the upcoming VBS programs. Any help that you can provide will go a long way. Even a single hour can make a difference and there are lots of different areas where you can help. So if you can assist at all please let the church office know. The dates again are from August 8-12 and August 15-19. So please say a prayer, check your calendars, and lend a hand. Now also a reminder that right in the middle of that on Sunday August 14<sup>th</sup> is the annual church outdoor worship service and picnic. The worship begins at 10:00 and the picnic lunch will follow. There is a signup sheet in the narthex. This year we are encouraging everyone to bring a friend as well. I look forward to seeing you all there. Now that I have all the announcements out of the way I will get to the meat of this month's message.

As is usual I was having a challenging time trying to determine what to write about this month, so I decided to cast lots and see where the Lord would lead me. So in the spirit of trust, I opened my Bible to the New Testament, and then let it fall open from there. I then picked the first highlighted section I came across. And I love the way the Lord works, sure enough I landed in 2 Timothy chapter four, second of the pastoral epistles. The highlight words that stood out could not have been any more appropriate. "**Preach the Word**". In the opening of this fourth chapter the Apostle Paul gives his young pastoral protégé and us some very prophetic and sound information. It goes like this:

**4** I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: <sup>2</sup> preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. <sup>3</sup> For the time is coming when people will not endure sound<sup>[healthy]</sup> teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, <sup>4</sup> and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. <sup>5</sup> As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry.

We see that Paul is charging us in the presence of both God and Jesus, to preach the Word. We are to be always ready to do it. He uses the term in season and out of season, to let us know that when is not important, we are to do it whenever and wherever we have the opportunity. And then he tells us how we are to do it; he says reprove. By reprove, he means we are to reject or disprove false teachings. We are to rebuke, which in this case means to criticize them (those false teachers), let them know the errors in their teachings and understandings. Then we are to exhort, which means we are urge them strongly to do the right thing, and we are to do all of those things with the following in mind; we are to do it with complete patience and teaching. I don't know about you, but when I am attempting to reprove, rebuke, and exhort someone, doing it with complete patience is definitely a

It can also be a challenge to teach completely, particularly if someone does really want to hear you. Now Paul, in the wisdom of the Holy Spirit knew this, which leads us into verse 3. "The time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching," the Greek might actually be better translated to healthy teaching,

I believe the time is not only coming, but that time is here. Paul speaks of itching ears and accumulating teachers to suit their own passions, another word we could use for passions would be agendas. If you don't believe that is happening in our world right here and right now, I am afraid you are living in a box or wearing blinders. I feel it is quite apparent that much of world has indeed turned away from truth. The number of people in this world following a Biblical truth is getting smaller every day. The world truth has taken over and is running rampant and has definitely wandered off into myths. There is a tipping point, a point of no return, all of which is leading up to our Lord's triumphant return. So you might ask, what do we do in the meantime? Paul, through the Holy Spirit helps us out there as well; "Always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." Just as the story by Jesus of the 10 virgins, we must be ever watchful, care our spare oil, and be ready for Christs return. We must do our best to endure any sufferings we may encounter and trust in the Lord always, do the work of an evangelist.

What is the work of an evangelist? Simply put, an evangelist is one who proclaims the good news, the Good News of the Gospel, and finally fulfill your ministry. For me that is easy to define, you are my ministry, Zion Lutheran Church, not the building but you, the people, are my ministry, I am charged to faithfully administer the sacraments and preach the Word. You may ask, what is my ministry? Luther defines your ministry as your vocation, and you can have many, your vocation as a husband or wife, as father or mother, son or daughter, your vocation as in the job you fill, sharing your ministry, the Good News of the Gospel, with those you live with, work with, fish with, golf with, picnic with, share life with. We are all ministers of God's Word; we are all evangelists. We share that word with everyone, everywhere, every day, without ceasing.

And guess what, we will fall short, we unfortunately won't reach everyone, everywhere, every day, because we as sinful human beings simply can't. But the good news is; we are forgiven, and we can try again tomorrow, and the next day, and the next. until our time is up or our Lord returns. Now you might be wondering, why? Because, laid up for you is the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to you on that day! And I close with a statement that I like to repeat over and over. A statement as to why we do what we do.

We do not do all these things to be saved, we do them because we have already been saved. It is never about what we do, it is always about what Jesus has done for us.

#### "All People That on Earth Do Dwell"

**William Kethe** (also **Keithe**) (died 6 June 1594) was a Bible translator, especially of the Psalms. Kethe is thought to have been born in Scotland, although this has never been confirmed. His name was first recorded as being among the Marian exiles in Frankfurt in 1555 and Geneva in 1557, suggesting he left with those who took John Knox's side in the troubles at Frankfurt. Kethe helped translate the Geneva Bible in 1560 and contributed twenty-five psalms to the 1561 Anglo-Genevan Psalter. Only ten of these were retained in the 1562 English Psalter, while the 1564 Scottish Psalter retained all 25. Most of his Psalms were translations from French sources. [citation needed] His version of Psalm 100, The Old Hundredth, is universally known by its first line ("All People That on Earth Do Dwell").

During the reign of Elizabeth I, Kethe served as Rector to the parish of Child Okeford in Dorset, (1561–1593). After retiring he remained in the village but he died within a year. Whilst serving as vicar, he had also had two spells as a military chaplain under Ambrose Dudley, 3rd Earl of Warwick at Le Havre in 1563 and 1569.

**Loys "Louis" Bourgeois** (French: [buʁʒwa]; c. 1510 – 1559) was a French composer and music theorist of the Renaissance. He is most famous as one of the main compilers of Calvinist hymn tunes in the middle of the 16th century. One of the most famous melodies in all of Christendom, the Protestant doxology known as the Old 100th, is commonly attributed to him. The Knowledge of his early life is sparse. His first publication, some secular chansons, dates from 1539 in Lyon. By 1545 he had gone to Geneva (according to civic records) and become a music teacher there. In 1547 he was granted citizenship in Geneva, and in that same year he also published his first four-voice psalms.

In 1549 and 1550 he worked on a collections of psalm-tunes, most of which were translated by Clément Marot and Théodore de Bèze. The extent to which he was composer, arranger or compiler was not certain, until a long-lost copy of the Genevan Psalter of 1551 came to the library of the Rutgers University. In an *Avertissement* (note) to the reader Bourgeois specifies exactly what his predecessors had done, what he had changed and which were his own contributions. He is one of the three main *composers* of the hymn tunes to the Genevan Psalter.

Unfortunately, he fell foul of local musical authorities and was sent to prison on 3 December 1551 for changing the tunes for some well-known psalms "without a license." He was released on the personal intervention of John Calvin, but the controversy continued: those who had already learned the tunes had no desire to learn new versions, and the town council ordered the burning of Bourgeois's instructions to the singers, claiming they were confusing. Shortly after this incident, Bourgeois left Geneva never to return: he settled in Lyon, his Geneva employment was terminated, and his wife tardily followed him to Lyon.

While in Lyon, Bourgeois wrote a fierce piece of invective against the publishers of Geneva. His daughter was baptized in Paris in May 1560 (as a Catholic), and also in 1560 a Parisian publisher posthumously printed a volume of his secular chansons – a form he had condemned as "dissolute" during his Geneva years.

Louis Bourgeois is the one most responsible for the tunes in the Genevan Psalter, the source for the hymns of both the Reformed Church in England and the Pilgrims in America. In the original versions by Bourgeois, the music is monophonic, in accordance with the dictates of John Calvin, who disapproved not only of counterpoint but of any multiple parts; Bourgeois though did also provide four-part harmonizations, but they were reserved for singing and playing at home. Many of the four-part settings are syllabic and chordal, a style which has survived in many Protestant church services to the present day.

Of the tunes in the Genevan Psalter, some are reminiscent of secular chansons, others are directly borrowed from the Strasbourg Psalter; The remainder were composed by successively Guillaume Franc, Louis Bourgeois and Pierre Davantès. By far the most famous of Bourgeois' compositions is the tune known as the Old 100th. The tune also is used in the hymn "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow".

#### **SOME IMPORTANT GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER**

- Be sure to shop for light- or medium-weight towels, which are easier for Kit recipients to hand wash and air dry, take up less storage space and are considerably less expensive than the fluffier towels we may prefer to use.
- Bath towels vary in size. The 52" X 27" size listed in the guidelines is the maximum size. 20" x 40" is a good guideline for a minimum size.
- · Please give new items only.
- Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages or your group's name.
- Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.
- Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed.
- · All items should be new and in good condition.
- Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.



#### **INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING IN EACH PERSONAL CARE KIT**

<b>ONE</b> light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
<b>TWO</b> or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz. any brand, in original wrapping
<b>ONE</b> adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging*
ONE sturdy comb, remove packaging
<b>ONE</b> metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

 Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope; no plastic bags or wrap

#### **HOW TO PACK YOUR PROJECT PROMISE KITS**

- Fold the towel in half. Place the rest of the items in the towel, fold and roll so nothing falls out, and secure with yarn, ribbon, string or rubber bands.
- Pack completed Kits, like items together, in boxes.
   Label contents in LARGE, BLOCK LETTERS on the outside of the boxes.
- Use strong cartons secured with packing tape, not to exceed 40 pounds.
- · Do not use plastic or paper bags to pack donations.
- Include the name and address of your group or congregation on each box and label the contents
