Happy December, Advent is here, we are preparing for our Lord and Savior's arrival. Both His first Advent and the long awaited second advent. We started our Advent with our opening service this past Sunday on the theme of "Who is This"? Truly the most important question in the world, for not knowing and believing who Jesus is, spells condemnation. Pretty harsh word, but a statement of truth and fact.

Believing comes from faith, and how does faith come,

"Consequently, faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word about Christ." (Romans 10:17).

Now, while we are told faith comes through hearing, it can also come through reading or seeing the Word. In my experience reading is fine, but true clarity seems to come through hearing, talking, discussing, sharing of God's Word. Many is the time where I have read a section of scripture, and it wasn't until speaking to or listening to someone else discuss that section did it really click. For those in our different Bible study groups we'll all agree, there are times when through hearing we have those great "Ah Ha! moments". When suddenly the Holy Spirit says, "now it is time for you to understand what that really means".

Now, you might wonder where is He going with this. Well, here is the point. Last month, I put out the request for you to offer up something you might like me to go over in one or more of my monthly newsletter covers. Sorry to say it, but, you all let me down, not a single response? That led me to two possible conclusions. First, no one read my newsletter cover last month \square or none of you have any questions? So, for this month I chose my own topic.

It has to do with an email I received from an organization called Barna. Now Barna is a highly regarded and reputable Christian survey organization and they are constantly releasing all kinds of survey data about Christianity in the United States and the world today. A few weeks ago they released a new study entitled: "How Millennials and Gen Z are driving a Bible Reading Comeback". A couple of the key points were;

*Weekly Bible reading among U.S. adults has climbed to 42%, up 12 points since a 15 year low in 2024.

*Next, young adults lead the way, nearly half of Gen Z and Millennial are engaged in Scripture weekly. On the down side; reading out paces belief, While more Americans are reading the Bible, a smaller percentage affirms its authority, revealing a gap between curiosity and conviction.


I found all of these things very interesting, more reading but not more believing, so I asked myself where is the disconnect. After reading more deeply into their survey and all the graphs and charts

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and tables I believe, I began to see the disconnect. I think it is kind of like the Bible Study group who haven't had their "Ah Ha moment" yet. Their reading, but perhaps not fully understanding it, they aren't having the studies, they aren't getting the questions answered when they don't understand.

The more I read this the more I was reminded of the story of the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts Chapter



8. An angel of the Lord tells Philip to go to the desert road that leads from Jerusalem to Gaza. There Philip sees the Ethiopian eunuch going to the road in a chariot and he is reading the book of Isaiah. The Spirit tells Philip to "Go to that chariot and stay near it." So Philip is running down the road beside the chariot as the eunuch is reading Isaiah, and Philip asked him "Do you understand what you are reading"? To which the eunuch replied: "How can I," he said, "unless someone explains it to me?"

So, he invited Philip to come up and sit with him. Philip then explains the passage to the eunuch. The scriptures became clear to him through Philips explanation, so much so that they stopped the chariot on the side of the road and baptized the eunuch in water on the side of the road. (from Acts 8:26-40).

Anyway, a long way to get to my point, I can't help but believe many of those young people who are now reading the Bible are in need of help, in need of someone to help make it clear. So that rather than just reading an old book with some good points, they can understand that it is indeed the inspired word of God, put forth of their eternal salvation.

I am currently working on ways that I, we, may be able to help those people. Think about it, pray about it, let me know what you think. How might we, as both individuals and as the Church, help those who are looking for answers. I will be awaiting for your responses or at the very least, a thumbs up to let me know you read my article.



COOK'S CORNER Easy Chicken Quesadillas Ingredients:

- 4 large flour tortillas
- -1 cup cooked, shredded chicken (rotisserie chicken works great)
- -2 cups shredded cheese (cheddar, Monterey Jack, or a mix)
- -Optional additions: canned black beans (rinsed), corn, finely diced bell peppers, or spinach -Cooking spray or a little oil/butter for the pan For dipping: salsa, sour cream, or guacamole

Instructions: Prepare your fillings: In a bowl, mix the shredded chicken, cheese, and any optional fillings you choose to use.

Heat the pan: Place a large skillet or griddle over medium heat and lightly coat it with cooking spray or a thin layer of oil/butter.

Assemble the quesadillas: Lay one tortilla in the pan. Sprinkle an even layer of the chicken and cheese mixture over one half of the tortilla. Cook and fold: Cook for a few minutes until the bottom starts to lightly brown and the cheese begins to melt. Carefully fold the empty half of the tortilla over the filling to create a half-moon shape. Flip: Gently flip the guesadilla and cook for another 2-3 minutes until both sides are golden brown and the cheese is fully melted. Serve: Remove the guesadilla from the pan, let it cool slightly, and then cut it into wedges. Serve immediately with your favorite dipping sauces.



Making a Difference - Peru Mission

Rev. Dr. Dwayne & Cheryl Lueck recently traveled to Peru and represented the North WI District at the Peru FORO. Rev. Lueck shared the following...

MAKING A DIFFERENCE Recently Cheryl and I had the opportunity to travel to Lima, Peru to see the mission work currently taking place and to encourage the workers who have been supported by the North Wisconsin District since 2013. On Friday we visited Castillo Fuerte ("a mighty fortress" in Spanish) where the children attend weekdays after school to receive a meal, have Bible time, do crafts, have time for recess and close with chapel. These children greeted our team with hugs and gifts and sang a song especially for us.

On Saturday night, in the same building, they have a worship service. Cheryl was talking with Mercedes, the cook at Castillo Fuerte, after worship. She said, "You don't know how important it is that the children see your team here. We tell the children your gifts allow them to have their lunch. These children come with lots of shortcomings." Then she wiped tears from her eyes.

In Lima there are three different worship sites – La Victoria (where Castillo Fuerte is located), Los Olivos, and San Borja. Presently Pastor Raphael, a pastor on loan from Brazil Lutheran Church, is serving the people along with Pastor Abraham, who works part-time. We were able to visit all three sites and worship at two of them.

We were part of a FORO which means "forum" in English. This FORO is made up of different entities from the US that specifically support the Peru mission. Representation at the FORO included us from the North Wisconsin District, Pastor Merker from the Southeastern District LCMS, a couple from Ascension Lutheran in Burnsville, Minnesota, Pastor Ted Krey who is the lead missionary in Latin America and works in the Dominican Republic, and missionary James Sharp from Puerto Rico who helps advise the Peru church.

We discussed the current work taking place and learned about the challenges and future plans. Right now they need a new facility for Castillo Fuerte as they need additional space for more children. The facility at San Borja needs remodeling for a worship area that can hold more than 30 people. There is a hope that an LCMS pastor will soon be joining the staff so they can meet the needs of the people in all three areas.

Finally, it's all about bringing Jesus to people in an urban area. Yulenka, a former student at Castillo Fuerte, received a college degree in psychology and may soon be the director at the same place she grew up. She is a member at La Victoria and recently brought her parents, brothers and niece to church. They have all been baptized and confirmed at La Victoria. Yulenka's boyfriend is also coming to confirmation class. They are all learning that "God is our (their) refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." (Psalm 46:1)

Yepci, the present director of Castillo Fuerte, texted Cheryl: "Thank you very much for your support in expanding God's work. Many blessings to you." So we would like to extend that blessing and sincere thanks to you, the congregations and members of the North Wisconsin District. Your mission offerings to the NWD contribute support for the workers at the Peru mission along with purchasing meals for the children. You are making a difference!

FROM THE DISTRICT PRESENT

"Oh give thanks to the LORD, for He is good; for His steadfast love endures forever!" (1 Chronicles 16:34 ESV)

I enjoy some simple things like fresh blacktop and clear ice cubes.

Old Testament Hannah was not concerned with life's trivialities. Hannah did not even have a son. She cried. She prayed passionately and God answered. Hannah gave birth to Samuel. What did she do next? She kept her vow. She gave Samuel into the Lord's service. Her vow was not to give him up for a summer or two when he turned eighteen. She promised, "I will give him to the LORD all the days of his life" (1 Samuel 1:11). After weaning Samuel, she brought him, the very son she received in answer to prayer, to the House of the LORD. Imagine giving up your three-year-old for special training away from home for a lifetime of service not knowing if you would see him more than once a year. Hannah gives thanks to the Lord by returning to Him the very thing for which she prayed.

There is a significant difference between simple things and family members. Ice cubes melt, pavement wears out, they cost money, and they do not care. My wife, children, and grandchildren love me, care about me, and I love them all. Nancy works hard and makes me laugh. For years I watched her willingly sacrifice sleep and never spend a dime on herself if it meant caring for our children and providing what she believed they needed. She enjoys our children and their families, prays for them every day, and keeps showing me how to enjoy what matters most. Recently, when I drove into our daughter's driveway, Nancy was holding a five-foot long blue hollow plastic tube at a 45-degree angle over a larger yellow Tonka dump truck. Peter and Theo, two of our grandsons, were busy dropping walnut sized rocks one at a time into the top of the tube and watching them come out below. The dump truck was half-full, not ready yet for one of the boys to drive it away. It was so dear to see. How could Old Testament Hannah have given up little Samuel?

What are the names of the people God has given you to love and care about, and to thank Him for? For what else will you give Him thanks this month and throughout the year? As I type this Thanksgiving devotion, I am completing week fifteen in my role as district president. I thank the Lord for the privilege, and for aspects of ministry happening across our North Wisconsin District. Pastor Hanson, from Pilgrim, Green Bay, has agreed to lead our district missions team to help us expand our NWD national and international missions footprint. Meanwhile, the first group of congregations is working through a "church clarity" four-session process to form a ministry plan with reachable goals. Regarding the fostering of Lutheran education, DJ, from the district office, is leading our effort to support our Lutheran schools, classical education opportunities, and to expand our participation in and support for home-schooling cooperatives. Pastor Baye, from Hope, DePere, is completing his Doctor of Ministry studies regarding the role of fathers in shaping the faith of their children. We have asked him to chair our district's Family Ministry emphasis. We aim to start with simple things, like providing pastors little note cards with a short prayer printed on them to hand to dads, and to ask them to kneel with their toddlers at bedtime to pray.







Isaiah 51:4-6 – "Give attention to Me, My people, and give ear to Me, My nation; for a law will go out from Me, and I will set My justice for a light to the peoples. My righteousness draws near, My salvation has gone out, and My arms will judge the peoples; the coastlands hope for Me, and for My arm they wait. Lift up your eyes to the heavens, and look at the earth beneath; for the heavens vanish like smoke, the earth will wear out like a garment, and they who dwell in it will die in like manner; but My salvation will be forever, and My righteousness will never be dismayed."

I got some old family pictures from my Dad in the mail today, from the early 1980s. I couldn't help laughing at some of the clothes they showed me wearing! To the best of my knowledge, none of those clothes are still around today; clothing wears out and has to be replaced, even favorite pieces. And that can be sad, if the piece we're having to replace is one we love.

We realize that clothes are temporary—but we don't usually think of heaven and earth this way, too. And yet that is what God says—that creation in its current form is passing away; "the heavens vanish like smoke, and the earth will wear out like a garment." It will do us no good if our hearts are bound up in anything in the current world order; sooner or later it will be gone.

What then can we trust? What will last forever? What is safe for us to set our hearts on? God tells us: "My salvation will be forever, and My righteousness will never be dismayed." Jesus Himself is our righteousness and our salvation, and He will never leave us or abandon us; if we love Him, we will have the One we love forever. Death cannot take Him, for He has already suffered and died in order to make us clean, forgiven, beloved children of God; and He has risen from the dead, never to die again. Because Jesus lives, we too will live forever; and we will live with Him and one another in joy when the present heavens and earth are a memory, pictures from the past.

So what can we love that will last forever? God Himself, who loved us first; and God's people, to whom He has given eternal life. For when Jesus holds us in His hands, we can never be lost from Him or one another.

James 5:7








House of David: Season 1 DVD

Then my sons joined him in building a house of cards that reached three levels...until our cat jumped up to investigate and knocked it down. We played a round of Scrabble and had my favorite snow day lunch: grilled cheese and tomato soup.

We took a long walk in the woods behind our house, trudging through the drifts along the stream. We spotted deer tracks and played in the snow that was coming down in big fluffy flakes. When we returned, all the clocks in the house were blinking. I started to make dinner, happy to have things back to normal—even better than normal.

A day that began without electricity, cut off from the rest of the world, ended with hot chocolate and power restored. Recharged by the unexpected gift of a day together.

Hebrews 1:1–14

Something Better

The book of Hebrews addresses Christians in Rome undergoing persecution sometime close to 64 AD when Christians began dying for their faith under Nero. The book is a clarion call to not return to Judaism, which was a legal religion while Christianity had become an illegal religion.

The author urges people to remain faithful to their Christian confession (Heb 3:1; 4:14; 10:23), warns against drifting away and neglecting salvation (Heb 2:1, 3), points out the danger of losing confidence in God's promises (Heb 3:6) and falling away from the faith (Heb 3:12). People were tempted to become rebellious and unbelieving like Israel (Heb 3:16–19) for they had not progressed into Christian adulthood (Heb 5:11–6:2). They had experienced God's saving gifts in Christ but may end up rejecting him (Heb 6:4–6; 10:29; 12:25). Sluggishness (Heb 6:12) could lead to something far worse—apostasy (Heb 10:26). Thus, repeatedly the author reminds people that in Christ, they have something better.

I'm therefore calling our Advent and Christmas emphasis *Something Better*. Hebrews repeatedly explains the gifts God gives Israel through Moses and then promises that we have something much better! My preaching plans are as follows:

Advent 1 "A Better Word" (Hebrews 1:1–2)

Advent 2 "A Better Glory" (Hebrews 1:3a)

Advent 3 "A Better Absolution" (Hebrews 1:3b)

Christmas Eve "A Better Name" (Hebrews 1:4–14)

Dear Lord, don't let us miss You this Christmas season. Help us to simplify our activities and traditions so we can focus our celebration on Your birth. Thank You for being the Prince of Peace, and I ask You for that supernatural peace to reign in our hearts. Thank You for the simple but life-changing message of Your love for us. In Jesus' Name, Amen.
