That we are prepared through Jesus and what are we waiting for to spread the good word.

Roll Call: Chuck Chronis (President), Mary Koosmann (Financial Secretary). Lynn Ladd (Education), Todd Vyskocil (Treasurer), Nick Jarvela (Trustees) Cheri Tamke (LFOJ), Rick Williams (Vicar).

Minutes: Motion by Cheri, second by Nick, to approve the minutes of Nov. 17, 2014, as printed. Motion carried.

Vicar's Report: Sunday and Wednesday services going very well. Sunday and Monday Bible Studies going well. Met with the Elders and will be setting up a training program for their continuing education, covering Luther's Catechism, the Church's Constitution and By-Laws. Evangelism met last Monday--the 8th with Vicar Rick and reviewed the "by laws" of Evangelism and what our exact mission should or needs to be versus what we've been doing. Those in attendance were asked to review the list and next month we will discuss in more detail and come up with our plan for 2015. Lori Landry, Chairman Stewardship: We will be meeting with Vicar Rick and going over the "by-laws" and talking about a new time/talent listing. Hope to have something to report at January's meeting. Diane Cashman, Chairman Education: The Education Board met on December 10th. We have another member who has requested to drop from the board, Lilly Harrelson. We now have three members and should have six members. We will be putting out another plea for members. We are very excited to announce that we have a high school student who will be on the board, Lexie Warren. The deficit is also from the new boiler system. The congregation approved a loan for the boiler and roof from LCEF that is being used.

Do You Know? Did You Know?

What are the above figures? Our expenses for the Church? Wouldn't that be nice, that each year it has gone down. That is not the case. This list is our "giving" amounts. They have drastically gone d-o-w-n each year. Why do you think that is?

There may be several reasons for that. People may think we don't need as much money now that we haven't been paying for a Pastor. That is partially true. We were able to save some money in 2011 and 2012 to be used for emergency situations. But now over 50% of that money has been used for unexpected expenses. Do you remember the years prior to 2011, when the church had to borrow money to meet expenses? We have been blessed we haven't had to do that.

So another reason giving may be less is that people think we're doing fine with what is received, because nothing has been said. That's right, nothing has been said and maybe this should have been brought up earlier.

When was the last time you received an increase in wages or income? It seems whenever we do get ahead with income there are more increases in bills like water, electric, insurance and on and on. Some think the Church can get by and when things get better for themselves they'll start giving a bit more. Will that day ever come? Doesn't the church have expenses that increase annually also? The church has maintenance issues also to handle, that is why a loan for \$90,000 was taken out for the replacement of the furnace and roof.

So what are we asking for? Mainly two things – give what you feel the Lord deserves and do it regularly. We have approximately 150 envelopes assigned to members of the congregation. If each one of those persons/families would increase their offering by \$5.00 we would take in an additional \$39,000.00 a year. WOW! But there is a catch. Not everyone who has an envelope uses them. And some only use them when they are in Church and don't fill the missed Sundays' envelopes. What about you?

To make it easier we have a direct deposit for offerings through Vanco. You can have your offering taken out on a certain date, once a month, weekly, whatever you decide. If you would like information on this opportunity contact the office. There is also a small information sheet on the bulletin board.

So do you let the person that sits in the pew behind or ahead of you take care of it? Now is the time for you to reflect on the gifts God has blessed you with and give to God what is his, because none of what we have is ours.

Colors of the Liturgical Season

White

In addition to its use during Eastertide, white is the appointed color for such festive Sundays as Christmas

and its twelve days; Epiphany (Jan. 6) and the first Sunday following it, observed as the Baptism of Our Lord; the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, also known as Transfiguration Sunday; Holy Trinity Sunday; and twenty-one minor festivals and occasions listed on the church year calendar in Lutheran Worship. In all, white serves as the best festive color for the church year.

Green

Lutheran Worship calls for the use of green during the seasons of Epiphany and Pentecost. The first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox (March 21), also known as Easter Sunday, determines the length of these two seasons.

The days of Epiphany may entail a total of, but not more than, eight Sundays. The season of Pentecost, on the other hand, can last from 22 to 28 Sundays. Green is the appointed color for all but a few of the Sundays during these seasons. Consequently, green may be used an average of six to eight months of any given liturgical year!
