"Mom, I'm always in the middle of something," I snapped.


ness of my tone. "Mom, I'm sorry," I blurted. Lent was about to begin, and I had been thinking

#### When We Feel Forgotten By Martin Luther (Faith Alone - 365 Devotional Readings)

Nevertheless, the chief cupbearer didn't remember Joseph. He forgot about Him... Genesis 40:23

After being forgotten by the cupbearer, Joseph struggled with the temptation of becoming impatient and complaining. When the devil saw this, he attacked Joseph with even more fiery arrows. Christ Himself felt these arrows when the devil tempted Him: "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become loaves of bread" (Matthew 43). In the same way, the devil might have said to Joseph, "Go ahead and continue your miserable struggle. You know that your prayers are useless. You cry to God and that God would free you and restore your honor because you interpreted the chief cupbearer's dream. Well, let God save you if he feels like it." The devil continued to torment Joseph with his fiery arrows, even though Joseph was already weak and wounded.

When faithful people are happy and when they sing, "The Lord is my strength and song" (Psalm 118:14), the devil stays far away from them. All complaining and impatience soon end. As long as believers praise and thank God, then temptation, sadness, and unbelief disappear. Heaven is opened wide and hell is shut with words like these: "I will thank the Lord at all times. My mouth will always praise him" (Psalm 34:1).

But as soon as we stop praising God, miserable, lonely, sad thoughts return. That's what happened to Joseph when he remembered how his brothers had sold him. They were at home having a good time while he was lying in prison, tied up and miserable. This is how the devil works. When the water becomes troubled, he likes to fish. He uses these opportunities to tempt people to abandon their faith and give up in despair.





### Let it Snow!

Oh, the weather outside is frightful But the fire is so delightful And since we've no place to go Let it snow! Let it snow! Let it snow! (from "Let It Snow!" - written by lyricist Sammy Cahn and composer Jule Styne)

It is snowing outside! Beautiful! It is the day after Ash Wednesday. The office is closed. Schools are closed. Some called off Ash Wednesday worship because of the snow. Everything is white!

"Let it snow!" According to Google, this song was written in July 1945 in California as they hoped for cooler conditions during a heat wave. Snow is reality here in Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula. The truth is - most of us don't mind it since we grew up with and know how to deal with snow. "The fire IS delightful." Plenty of snow also means snowmobile trails are open and people are skiing, which is good for the Northwoods economy.

Something else good is getting into God's Word – reading it and allowing it to speak to us. Nothing new. Getting into the Word was the focus of the District Board of Directors' meeting in early February. The board is reading Built on the Rock (BOTR) by Ted Kober. Ted has worked with conflicted congregations and has learned that the healthiest congregations are ones in the Word.


He stated: "The healthy churches I encounter benefit from larger percentages of people in regular Bible study. Their leaders demonstrate scriptural knowledge and trust in Christ as they practice repentance through confession and forgiveness" (p13 BOTR). He learned that in many conflicted situations the leaders were not in the Word. As St. Paul wrote: "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God" (1 Corinthians 1:18).

It is the season of Lent. People are asked: "What are you giving up for Lent?" Maybe we should turn that around and ask: "What are you doing for Lent?" May I be so bold to suggest that you take time at home to get into God's Word. Read the Bible on your own. Read Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Read about the life of Jesus and what HE said and did. Read about his journey to the cross for you and me to redeem us from our sins. Lent has begun but you still have all of March and early April to get four books read.

Our faith and our confessions are based on the Bible. Unfortunately, we often take God's Word for granted, but it is the basis of what we believe and hold onto in 2023. The Bible speaks to us and our situations bringing comfort and hope, as we often recite Psalm 23. Psalm 1:2-3 tells us: "His delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night. He is like a tree by streams of water that yields its fruit in its season, and its leaf does not wither." Our daily strength as a Christian is strong when we are connected to God's Word.

During Lent we hear the Passion story and what Jesus went through to forgive us through His suffering and death on the cross. He did it out of love for you and me. By the time you read this maybe the snow will be gone. Spring break is around the corner. They are playing baseball in Arizona and Florida where it is warm. March Madness will be starting. Before you know it - it will be Holy Week and Easter. Don't forget God's Word - read it and believe it!


