And so we will be with the Lord forever. <sup>18</sup> Therefore encourage one another with these words. (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18.)


I don't want you to be uninformed, we will not grieve like those who have no hope, and for now we have been left until the coming of the Lord. However,

#### "My Faith Looks Up to Thee"

Ray Palmer is often considered to be one of America's best nineteenth-century hymn writers. After completing grammar school he worked in a Boston dry goods store, but a religious awakening prodded him to study for the ministry. He attended Yale College (supporting himself by teaching) and was ordained in 1835. A pastor in Congregational churches in Bath, Maine (1835-1850), and Albany, New York (1850-1865), he also served as secretary of the American Congregational Union (1865-1878). Palmer was a popular preacher and author, writing original poetry as well as translating hymns. He published several volumes of poetry and hymns, including Sabbath Hymn Book (1858), Hymns and Sacred Pieces (1865), and Hymns of My Holy Hours (1868). His complete poetical works were published in 1876.



Palmer, Ray, D.D., son of the Hon. Thomas Palmer, a Judge in Rhode Island, was born at Little Compton, Rhode Island, Nov. 12, 1808. His early life was spent at Boston, where he was for some time clerk in a dry-goods store. At Boston he joined the Park Street Congregational Church, then under the pastoral care of Dr. S. E. Dwight. After spending three years at Phillips Academy, Andover, he entered Yale College, New Haven, where he graduated in 1830. In 1835 he became pastor of the Central Congregational Church, Bath, Maine. During his pastorate there he visited Europe in 1847. In 1850 he was appointed to the First Congregational Church, at Albany, New York, and in 1865 Corresponding Secretary to the American Congregational Union, New York. He resigned in 1878, and retired to Newark, New Jersey. He died at Newark, Mar. 29, 1887.

Most of Dr. Palmer's hymns have passed into congregational <u>use</u>, <u>and</u> have won great acceptance. The best of them by their combination of thought, poetry, and devotion, are superior to almost all others of American origin. The first which he wrote has become the most widely known of all. It <u>is:</u>

My faith looks up to Thee. Faith in Christ. This hymn was written by the author when fresh from <u>College</u>, and during an engagement in teaching in New York. This was in 1830. The author says concerning its composition, "I gave form to what I felt, by writing, with little effort, the stanzas. I recollect I wrote them with very tender emotion and ended the last line with tears."



#### Lowell Mason (1792-1872)

Lowell Mason, noted composer of sacred music, was organist of the Independent Presbyterian Church (1820-1827), and Superintendent of its Sunday School (1815- 1827).

A native of New England, Mason moved to Savannah at the age of twenty. He resided in this city for approximately fifteen years until his return to Massachusetts in 1827. He was active in the civic and religious life of his adopted city. He served as Secretary of the Savannah Missionary Society; was an active organizer of a school for the instruction of sacred <a href="mailto:music.and">music.and</a> was Superintendent of the inter-denominational Savannah Sabbath School.

While Mason was the organist of the Independent Presbyterian Church, he set to music Bishop Reginald Heber's hymn, "From Greenland's Icy Mountains." In the church that then stood on this site the now famous hymn was sung in 1824 for the first time.

[From Greenland's Icy Mountains." In our hymnal is #835 "On Galilee's High Mountain. There are seven other hymns in our hymnal that have his tunes]

Among later <u>well known</u> compositions by Mason was the music for the great hymns, "**My Faith Looks Up to Thee**" and "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

3-5 people to arrive about one hour before the luncheon would start, Check the food tables that all condiments, utensils, etc. are provided. Refill food items when needed.


Clear the items, pack up leftovers for the family

Those words hit me like a thunderbolt from heaven. For the first time in my life I realized from the combination of the words from that song and the fire of the Holy Spirit coursing through my body that I had been trying to know God merely on an intellectual basis and that by definition, I could never hope to know the depth of the mind of my Creator. I had not realized the role of FAITH and TRUST in a good God, thinking that belief was some kind of intellectual activity and accomplishment of getting all the facts straight. That challenge of experiencing the certain hope of God's promises BY FAITH sparked a question in my head, "What if I really DO believe?" and from there, over days and months, that tiny spark of faith grew and became an avalanche of conviction by the power and grace of God not only in Jesus, but in the trustworthiness of the Bible in all its parts.

It was such a pivotal event, I've likened it to Paul's Damascus road experience or Luther's experience in a lightning storm and His own thunderbolt experience reading in Romans that "the just person lives BY FAITH." I think some of us are just more stubborn, not more special, and that God literally has to shake us up and put us on fire in order to get through to us. And of course, I invited Conley to my service of ordination who once again graced me with his presence!


#### What a Bird!

#### Faith Struggle, a Synopsis of a Journey

As a young child I was a strong believer in God and in Jesus Christ, my Savior. I was confirmed in the eighth grade and learned my catechism well, believing the more I understood intellectually, the better a Christian I was. I had no doubts. But doubts started in early high school when I was taught evolutionary theory as the answer to the existence of the universe and was told that the world was not created in six days as stated in the first chapters of Genesis. My instructors said that the universe began with a massive explosion called the Big Bang at least 13 billion years ago and that man evolved over time from lower life forms all directed by "mother nature."


Considering myself an intellectual I began to view the Bible as a collection of myths and contradictions and thought it my job to sort out what was real and what was made up. At age 14 I took a list of what I saw as contradictions in the Bible to my father who was also my pastor. The timing was bad as he was trying to watch a game on the TV and after about just 10 minutes he said in frustration, "You don't believe? Well, you better just START believing!" as he pounded the table. That unhelpful advice really just sent me into a tailspin of doubt which increased each year until I found myself enrolled in a Christian college of my parents' choice at age 17.

I was the only unbeliever at St John's College in Winfield, KS and was very vocal about it. The other students sort of took me on as their missionary project and I was in daily discussions with earnest faith-filled students whom I considered brainwashed and duped into believing by well-meaning parents and mentors.

One day I was having a discussion with a strong believer named Conley on a sidewalk in front of Baden Hall. He said to me, "Michael, you say you don't believe but I've never met anyone who talks more about God than you." I responded, "that's because all of you are all so brainwashed and I'm trying to help you see that you are wasting your lives by believing these myths when you could be free-thinkers and having a good time." He said, "I don't think so. I believe that the Holy Spirit has one foot in the door of your heart and He's trying like crazy to get in the rest of the way."

I immediately shook my head and responded with "No" but as I did so I felt something start at the top of my head that was similar to the feeling of the tingling of a foot when it falls asleep. I felt this strange sensation begin to grow throughout my scalp. It became much bigger and moved down through my shoulders and quickly through my entire body. Even my legs and feet were tingling. It felt like I was on fire and I couldn't speak anymore, so I ran quickly away thinking I was having a medical emergency. As I did, I passed the chapel on campus where the students were singing "He's everything to me." They had just come to the line which states, "Till BY FAITH I met him face to face, and I felt the wonder of His grace, then I knew that He was more than just a God a way up there, who really didn't care and now He walks beside me day by day helping me to find the narrow way..."

Whether it is healing from an illness, a chance encounter that changes the course of our lives, a moment of profound spiritual insight, or a reappearance of nature, miracles can be a powerful source of faith and hope.



This little girl redefined what it means to be a millennial. For the first time in over 6,000 years, a wild European bison (or wisent) was born in England. The species was hunted to near extinction by World War I, surviving only in zoos. The Kent team, like those around the continent, are reintroducing these woodland bison as "ecosystem engineers" that benefit everything in their habit. But bison can hide pregnancies to protect them from predators, and one of the introduced females was carrying a surprise. The birth of the female calf in September was a cherry on top of the re-emerging bison

#### **Greenback Cutthroat Trout**

Colorado's state trout are back making babies in their native rivers. In September, scientists announced that the species, once considered utterly extinct in the 1930s, was not only breeding but doing so on its own.



It's been a dramatic turn for the greenback, thought to be back in the 1950s, only for scientists to determine the fish were a similar subspecies, but not the greenback cutthroats. But in 2012, naturalists found the world's only purebred greenback trout hover in Bear Creek. Aquatic biologists carefully managed this discovery, and after years in the hatchery and reintroduction to the rivers, these trout are holding their own.

The stony terrain of this high-Andean plateau becomes a wonderfully weird carpet of pink and purple blossoms every five to seven years. Over 200 species of flowers unpredictably pop up in the driest place on earth when the conditions are just right, and scientists study the phenomenon to learn about survival in drought. This year, when Atacama had an even rarer winter bloom, the new Chilean president immediately moved to protect the region with national park status.

#### **Spawning Coral**

Coral is popping up everywhere, and even out of season. For the first time, scientists in Australia have spawned coral in captivity during the off-season, replicating the summer moon, tides, and temperatures ideal for creation in a laboratory to then plant on the reefs. Typically, coral only spawns twice between October and December, and this winter success creates hope that they can regenerate and restore the Great Barrier Reef faster. The UNESCO heritage-listed reef is also battling back without lab support. Northern and central stretches of the 1429-mile-long reef showed the largest coral cover in the last 36 years.



#### **Looking Back on Life**

A person may plan his own journey, but the Lord directs his steps. Proverbs 16:9

No one sees the hand of God working in his life more clearly than when he reflects back on the years of his life. Augustine said that if a person had a choice of either dying or reliving his life over again, he would certainly choose death because of all the danger and evil he so narrowly escaped. In one sense, this statement is certainly true.

Looking back, a person can see how much he has accomplished and suffered without trying or thinking about it, even against his wishes and will. He gave such little thought to what he was doing before it occurred or when it was happening. Now, after everything has been carried out, he is amazed and says, "Why did these things happen to me when I never thought about them or thought something completely different would happen. So Proverbs 16:9 is true, "A person may plan his own journey, but the Lord directs his steps," even against his plan and will. So we must agree that our own cleverness and foresight don't guide our life and actions. Instead, God's wonderful power, wisdom, and goodness guide us. Only when we look back do we fully recognize how often God was with us when we neither saw his hand nor felt his presence at the time it was happening. Accordingly, Peter said, "He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7).

Even if there were no books or sermons to tell us about God, simply looking back on our own lives would prove that he tenderly carries us in his arms. When we look back on how God had led and brought us through so much evil, adversity, and danger, we can clearly see the everpresent goodness of God, which is far above our thoughts, mind, and perceptions.
